Selection Criteria for Property Management Planning Project



The Steering Group will consider all applications against the selection criteria below.

We want to work with farmers who:

1. Are spread across the Cradle Coast region

Are operating viable businesses relative to enterprise type **or** who are managing a significant land area. This may include smaller land areas with significant environmental values.
2. Are representative of a diversity of enterprises including dairy, beef, intensive cropping (vegetables, poppies etc.) broad-acre cropping (cereals etc.), agro forestry, organic, specialty crops (flowers, berry fruits etc.)
3. May benefit from using their whole farm plan as part of a quality management system on their farm
4. Have an appreciation of whole farm planning as a tool for management
5. Are prepared to address on farm environmental issues, which may include soil, water, vegetation
6. Can demonstrate that they see commercial value in development of whole farm plans and that they will use their plan as part of their business operation
7. Are prepared to commit their time to the project both on farm and attending relevant group training workshops organised as part of the project.
8. Are able to extend project outcomes to the wider community by means of example.
9. May be able to encourage other farmers to become involved in natural resource issues.
